Put peace - it requires action Lord.
Prayerful action.
Not just hoping for something,

Put peace into each other's hands,

And *put* peace into each other's hand Lord? But what about my viewpoint and opinion? Because to put something into someone else's hand means

Will it be rebuffed? Mocked? Or accepted? Welcomed?

Having given, can I now recognize its worth? Can I treasure it?

Indeed, can I even accept it?

That's not so strange a question as it may seem.

Surely one of the most significant parts of the Parable of the Good Samaritan lies in the wounded traveller accepting help, care and provision from one of the Samaritans, who were so despised –

Giving and receiving peace requires generosity of spirit, openness and trust, as well as the humility to accept. It's a precious thing, then!

#### **OPEN HOUSE - OPEN DOORS**

When we opted to keep Wrexham Community open, it was with the intention of this being a house of Hosting and Hospitality. Over the past six months, we have opened up our house to different groups who have expressed their desire to hold meetings here. These are not only parochial groups but others from the area.

Lenten Stations. This group has come every Wednesday evening in Lent for a reflective sharing on themes from the Station of the Cross. After a short reflection the group were invited to share a thought or two, each one listening to the others using the synodal process of Conversations in the Spirit.

**Spirituality Group**. This group was set up in the Parish in September 2023 with a view to open up new avenues of spirituality, of deepening the faith. They come once a month to look at future possibilities. **Incredible Edible**. This is an informal network whose vision is to promote a healthier and more resilient future, where access to space to grow on public land is made simpler. They promote growing food for the community and the Foodbank, via allotments and public spaces in and around Wrexham. As well as growing, the volunteers save seeds and cuttings to use and give away. Many of the volunteers are also involved with the Repair Café, Wrexham.

Extinction Rebellion (XR) A group of women come together monthly to discuss and plan possibilities of protesting against investing in fossil fuels. They are very keen to promote Climate Change and have held several protests in the city over the past year. We sisters, often join them on such demonstrations.

S.V.P and Newman Society. These two groups are well established in the Parish and hold their monthly meetings in our Chapel. In March the Newman Group invited Fr. Charles Ramsey, from Wrexham diocese, to give an input on the book, 'Tomorrow's Church,' by Donal Harrington. He gave a very interesting input through power point, as well as examples of how he had tried to implement this in his former Parish in Rhyl.

Lay members / Quiet Prayer. The Holy Family Lay Members meet monthly here in our house and have initiated a quiet hour of prayer on the last Friday of each month. This latter is open to people of other denominations, who welcome the space to be quiet and pray. Usually these get togethers are followed by a cup of tea and refreshments.

Eucharistic Ministers. On 16<sup>th</sup> March about 20 Eucharistic Ministers from the Deanery of the Cathedral came for a day of recollection. This was organized by Kay with the help of Maria. A short presentation of the story of how the Eucharistic Ministry began, was followed by a prayerful power point on the Eucharist as 'Sending Forth'. After a short break, we broke into groups to share on the Scripture passage of the Feeding of the 5000. (John 6: 1-15). The General gathering summed up each one's reflections. The day ended with 15 minutes of Adoration.
